Editor / Publisher's Note:

Please note that the above listing is the – currently – proposed List of Articles. It has been composed from what I have had available in my personal library and from what several other kind people have sent to me.

There may well be a few more articles 'out there'; many of the 'permissions' are still in the process of being sought (some authors may decide to refuse their permission); this list of articles is therefore probably finalised in some way, what-so-ever. So, it is – at this stage – somewhat indicative.

The final volume – if the intended outline above is followed – has about 150 articles, from 50 authors, has about 1,850 pages and contains about 850,000 words. It is almost 'biblical' in proportion! It also contains a number of pictures and diagrams from the original articles and it reproduces some of the other photos and diagrams that were published with these articles.

This volume should be ready for publication in the autumn of 2022: slightly after the 100th anniversary of Gerda Boyesen's birth (May 18th, 1922). It is thus intended as a celebratory volume, as well as a fairly definitive statement about the process and development of her Biodynamic work – at least, to date.

There are, of course, many articles 'out there' in French, in German and in other languages (Spanish & Portugeuse), but I do not have access to any of these and therefore would not be able to edit them. Some of these have already been translated (viz. the *Adire* articles on transference: see §9). I can also recommend the recent Bøyesen Publications' (English-language) version of *Between Psyche and Soma*, and the re-printing of the original Collected Papers (in German), which had the effect or being a trigger for this volume.

I do hope that no-one will mind me having made some "suggestions" for fairly minor corrections, edits, changes in punctuation, and syntax, etc., to the original articles: these have been made throughout the book, irrespective of the authors. These suggestions have mainly been made to improve the consistency of punctuation, spelling, syntax, etc. Authors will, of course, have needed to approve the text of their articles in this book – wherever possible.

Authors have received a copy of their article(s) (as a PDF file) and been given an opportunity to 'correct' any mistakes or suggested edits (as long as they don't take too long to respond), and they will also receive an e-Book version of the whole book, as soon as it is finished. This volume is most likely going to be made available – primarily as an e-Book – available online from Body Psychotherapy Publications.

There might also be a very few printed copies made available at 'cost price + postage & production' (though this may be quite expensive, given the size – perhaps more suitable for a Biodynamic training centre, or as a definitive reference book). This celebratory volume is not intended as a commercial venture and will be priced accordingly.
